News from our Council

Deacon Policy Change:

For several years the Deacons have presented a Christmas gift to the widows and widowers of our church. The intention of the gift was to let them know that North Hills remembered and acknowledged them and their loss.

In July a letter was sent to each of the widows and widowers seeking their feelings and opinions on this program. The response was immediate and overwhelming. In varied forms, appreciation for the gift and the thought was expressed; but, with only one exception did any of the widows and widowers wish to have the program continue in its present form. Several ideas were offered, but none involved a gift.

At the October meeting the Deacons unanimously decided to discontinue the present practice of yearly gifting. In lieu, a one-time commemorative gift will be presented to each of the new widows and widowers expressing the church's understanding and support.

October Council News:

The Deacons will accept donations for 2025 staff Christmas gifts through December 14th. Please note 'Staff Christmas Present' on any donation checks. You can also give through our website, pulling down "staff gift" from the giving option tab. Donations received after December 14th will be rolled over to next year's gifts.

The Council met on Tuesday, October 21, at 7:00pm. Pastor Engle opened the meeting with devotions, (re)reading the ordination form for Elders and Deacons, and reminding Council members of their callings. After an opening prayer, the Pastor introduced **Catherine Nichols** (assigned to Parish 2) who was present to profess her faith in Jesus Christ. The council voted unanimously to accept her profession and granted her request for full membership, noting that we also received her membership papers from Christ Church Cranbrook, Bloomfield Hills. Elder **Michael Rupke** then offered a prayer of thanksgiving.

Resignations and replacements:

Jeff Feikens replaces resigned Child Care Board President **Kasey Garvelink**.

Pastor Engle replaces resigned Parish 1 Elder Danielle Walton.

Cody Heuker replaces resigned Parish 5
Deacon Anton van Breemen.

The pastor then read a letter of resignation from Deacon Anton van Breemen. The council accepted his resignation. Following our replacement process, Cody Heuker was selected by the council to fulfill Anton's term [Cody has accepted. -ed.].

The Pastor then left the meeting and Council Vice President Patrick Rode walked the Council through the proposed 2026 Ministry Plan of the Finance and Legal Committee. The Ministry Plan passed the Council, and will now be forwarded to the congregation, via mail, for proxy approval. The meeting concluded with Deacon **Kyle Dexter** offering a closing prayer.

News from Hesed Community Church

Hesed Community Church of Detroit is supported by the Reformed Church in America and the Christian Reformed Church in North America denominations. -ed.

Shalom is a Hebrew word prevalent in the Old Testament that you may have heard before. It



traditionally gets translated into English as "peace." When I think of peace, I usually think of the absence of conflict, which is too simplistic of a view to encompass the overall meaning of shalom. Christian Philosopher Nicholas Wolterstorff defines dwelling in shalom as "to enjoy living before God, to enjoy living in one's physical surroundings, to enjoy living with one's fellows, to enjoy life with oneself." We use a shortened interpretation that goes, "Nothing is missing; Nothing is broken." This is the image we are trying to demonstrate in the communities in which we live and serve. When Christ is experienced as Lord of a space, people in that space experience fullness of life and wholeness.

Because of this understanding, our desire for Christ's reign to be manifested in our communities goes far beyond merely the soul of persons. We believe that reconciliation of relationships, care for our creation, safe and dignified housing, and opportunities for holistic development are evidence of Christ's reign in a neighborhood. And these realities are necessitated and made possible by receiving and living within the covenant promises of God. We desire to live as witnesses of the joy and hope of shalom as we move in communities that have experienced much being broken and missing.

We are grateful for your support and participation as we live in this radical fashion with and amongst our neighbors.

We truly believe that if their gift is good only for us who receive, it is not fundraising in the spiritual sense. Fundraising from the point of view of the gospel says to people: "I will take your money and invest it in this vision only if it is good for your spiritual journey, only if it is good for your spiritual health." In other words, we are calling them to an experience of conversion: "You won't

become poorer, you will become richer by giving." We can confidently declare with the Apostle Paul: "You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity" (2 Cor. 9:11)." We pray that you are blessed and growing as you partner with us in this upside-down Kingdom where giving makes us all richer.

This fall, we said goodbye to our Intern Nika, who served with us for almost two years. We were so grateful for the relationship we shared and we bless her as she goes on to her next place of calling. We are in the process of further developing our urban ministry training program for both short and longer term partners. In addition to Nika and previously Al-Nisa, we received a college intern from Georgetown University for a month this summer and hope to host a number of partners for a week, a month, or two year stints in 2026.


